2024 Christina River Watershed Cleanup

Saturday April 13th, 2024



It was that time of year again for the Christina River Watershed Cleanup! How does so much trash end up in the oceans? Much of it travels along the path of fresh water downhill and into the oceans by way of rivers.



The Christina River Watershed includes beautiful rolling hills, farms and forests, and large and small towns. But litter, dropped or dumped by anyone, can travel the Brandywine, White Clay, and Red Clay Creeks, and Christina River before continuing into the Delaware River. This watershed provides more than 75% of the water supply for residents and businesses in New Castle County, Delaware.



The Christina River Watershed Cleanup's mission has always been the removal of manmade debris from within this beautiful watershed, while raising public awareness for pollution prevention. Since the Cleanup began in 1992, more than 360 tons of tires, appliances, household items, and other trash have been cleared from within the watershed.



The conference was held at the Smyrna Fire Company on Saturday, April 27, 2024.

This conference is where Chapter Regents give their annual report to the state. Yours truly, and that would be me, left my report(s) at home, on my desk, ready to go. Except they didn't go anywhere. I had to "wing it" and I didn't do a very good job.

So interspersed throughout these photos is the **Battell and Read Chapter 2023** Report.

The Battell and Read Chapter completed their first full year with an amazing # of accomplishments. They include:

- We were proud to sponsor the Serviam Academy in Wilmington for one of the first Legacy Grants for \$2,500; and a junior classroom grant for \$500 to Pleasantville Elementary School.
- 10 small move out kits were presented to the Hope Center for homeless veterans who have now found stable housing.

 Starting with zero dollars, it was necessary to think out of the box and as a result the Historic Bourbon Tasting in partnership with Jessop's tavern and Prestige LeDroit distributing and the creation and sale of DAR wristlets earned nearly \$3,000 with wristlets going as far as Guam.













- In October a joint meeting was held with the USD 1812 where we shared a speaker and adjourned for separate business meetings.
- DAR after Dark that has been very successful for working on projects or just to have to some fun.
- Over 500 holiday cards were signed for our active-duty military that were used in

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 the Stockings for Soldiers project where we spent two evenings volunteering our time sorting supplies and stuffing the personalized stockings for soldiers that were then shipped around the world.



- In December we cheered the end of the year with a Holiday Tea where we were honored to host our State Regent Barbara Seningen.
- Today's daughters embrace technology and as a result we tried Quickbooks for Nonprofits but found it didn't really meet our needs and moved to WAVE. We use Paypal and Springly, both for nonprofits for dues, ticket sales and donations with minimal to no loss to fees; we use Survey Monkey occasionally to vote on items that

cannot wait until the next meeting and Signup Genius to keep track of who is volunteering for what, when and where.

Madame State Regent, it is a pleasure serving under your administration and the Battell and Read chapter are already in the midst of another great year.

then told there was also





that we consider having lunch with Ray instead. Since we wanted to interview Ray, meeting him was just as good as interviewing him. George made us promise no interviewing. We all said yes, we would love to meet him for lunch, and we promised no interviewing. Ray wanted to go to his favorite restaurant, Mission BBQ. He told George that they knew him and that his meal would probably be free. The time came, and in walks, yes, I said walk! Ray and George. We were surprised there was no wheelchair or cane, and he only held on to George occasionally to get his balance from

sitting to standing. We all were happy and had a great time. A few people from other tables excused themselves



as they asked if they could say thank you to Ray for his service.

MaryEllen, Rebecca, George, and I beamed from ear to ear just to witness him saying hi and shaking hands. Even a 13-year-old boy



came over to shake his hand and thank him. It felt like being with a celebrity. As I reflected on

the moment we were with a celebrity, after all, how many people get to meet a man who is 102 years old, has a book written about his life, has flown 25 missions into Germany, earned

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Fame? But most of all, he left this country as a young boy, not knowing what tomorrow would bring, to fight and defend it so we could be safe. I say that he is a real celebrity, and we were proud to be sitting and having lunch with him.

website where Daughters may interact with one another and share resources and ideas—similar to the way we have interacted in national committee Facebook groups in the past. Since the launch of the Daughters Online Community in February 2023, national committee Facebook groups have transitioned to this private online community, making it possible to be an engaged DAR member without having a Facebook profile.

When you log in to the <u>Daughters Online</u> <u>Community</u>, you will see a news feed featuring the latest content from the "communities" you have chosen to join. These might be national committee communities, communities related to specific chapter officer roles or communities around specific interest areas. You may add your photograph to your member profile, as well as list your DAR interests and other details. The amazing resources you may struggle to find on Facebook because of the

constantly changing algorithm are organized in an easily accessible resource library. The community features a responsive design, meaning it functions well on your computer, your tablet or your smartphone. And you can to choose to receive specific communities' posts via email in either a digest format or in real-time, allowing you to keep up with the action right from your email inbox.

Log your Service to America hours here

DID YOU KNOW that the below activities ALL count as Service to America hours:

- Volunteering at local historical societies or associations
- Volunteering in schools, hospitals, and churches
- Volunteering with other lineage societies outside of DAR
- Transporting or sitting with those facing medical issues (non-family members)
- Service as a DAR chapter / C.A.R. senior society, state or national officer; committee chairman, vice chairman, cochairman, committee member, etc. This includes all planning, communication, board meetings, and committee meetings.

If you need help logging hours, or are unsure if your hours count, please contact Valarie.

*That is 30 hours per member for the year and is also based on the # of members on January 1, 2024. The goal for this year, with 25 members (so far), the hours will be 750.

What's a QUORUM? And why should you care

Our by-laws state that a quorum is 50% + 1 of our membership. We have 27 members as of May 3,, 2024 and our quorum is 14.

A quorum is the minimum number of members that must be present at any of its meetings to make the proceedings of that meeting valid. A meeting quorum is required at our chapter meetings for the purpose of conducting and voting on new chapter business. Without it we can't make motions, change bylaws, initiate group projects, purchase items, donate money, and so forth.

Please plan to attend as many meetings as possible so we can meet the quorum needed to achieve our chapter goals.



OPERATION PAPERBACK

Operation Paperback is a national, non-profit organization, whose volunteers collect gently-

used books and send them to American troops overseas, as well as veterans and military families here at home. Since 1999, we have shipped over 2.9 million books to countries all over the world (shown in orange on the adjacent map).

Step 1 - Collect

The following genres are most frequently requested: action, bestsellers, biographies and memoirs, fantasy, history, horror, mysteries, science-fiction, true crime. Do NOT send romance novels unless specifically requested by the individual!

Our troops have received a disproportionate amount of this genre and they aren't very happy about it.

Step 2 - Sort

Weed out any books that do not meet the standards of our program. Do NOT send:

- Ripped, stained, molding, damaged materials
- Religious material unless specifically requested (pamphlets and bookmarks included)
- Out of date items (ex. your uncle's map collection)

Remember that your package is a gift meant to entertain our troops and veterans! Take pride in what you send and don't be shy about pitching unsuitable materials into your recycling bin.

Then sort your books by genre. Also sort by hardcover/paperback. Overseas addresses receive paperbacks only. Domestic addresses can receive both hardcovers and paperbacks.

GOLDEN RULES OF GENEALOGY



ISHOULD

"SPELING DUSN'T COWNT"

 Back in the day folks couldn't spell and many could barely write, so how a name sounds is more



important than how it's spelled. Use wild card or Soundex searches to help find variant spellings of names.

ASSUME NOTHING

Check all your facts, don't assume that any particular document is right or wrong, and always try to find other independent sources to corroborate your facts as much as possible. Verify, verify, verify. For instance, don't assume that:

- your ancestors were married
- census information is accurate
- vital (or other) records were correct
- your ancestor's life events were recorded
- ancestors had the same name as their enslaver

USE DISCRETION

Never lie in your genealogy reports, but use discretion when reporting family information, especially when it involves living relatives.

ALWAYS DOCUMENT YOUR SOURCES, NO MATTER HOW MUCH

THEY CONTRADICT ONE ANOTHER

Over time, you will compile more data and those once seemingly contradictory pieces of evidence may prove to be just the pieces of the puzzle you need to prove or disprove your theory. Be consistent as you cite your sources. There are standard citation formats, but



even if you just make up your own format for listing your sources, be consistent with it. You want your descendants to be able to retrace your steps, so you always cite your sources.

MOST DATES ARE APPROXIMATE

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IF UNSURE, SAY SO

Future researchers will thank
you for being honest if
you simply say that you
cannot prove a specific
fact, yet you "suspect"
such and such is true. Don't
fudge the facts. Ever.



YOU CANNOT DO IT ALL ONLINE

Yes, we love doing research online and there's nothing better than using the computer to find new sources, view digital images of original documents and even connect with



relatives. For genealogists, the internet will never replace the wonderful work of libraries, county courthouses, archives, and historical societies. Do as much as you can online,

then turn off your computer and hit the bricks!

JUST BECAUSE IT'S ONLINE DOESN'T MEAN IT'S TRUE

The internet is a wonderful thing but it's filled with oodles of bad information. Don't make the mistake of believing anything you find online at face value. Verify against other sources, even if you paid for the information you found online. Consult the original source whenever possible.

PASS ALONG YOUR RESEARCH

No matter how many decades you spend

9 researching your family, your research will never be done. Plan on passing along your research to the next generation's

researchers. Leave excellent notes, cite all your sources, explain your shorthand ... in essence, leave your research the way you'd have liked to have found it.

DON'T DIE WITH YOUR STORIES STILL IN YOU

Giving credit to Dr. Wayne
Dyer for his "Don't die with
your music still in you," we
want to remind you to tell the

stories as completely and as accurately as possible. Genealogy isn't about just doing research. Genealogy is about telling the

stories and ensuring that your ancestor's legacies live on for generations to come. Without the stories, the research won't do anyone much good. The legacy

of your ancestors rests in your capable hands. Doing the research is fine, but always remember that you have been chosen to **tell their stories**.

DNA IS NOT A TRUMP CARD

DNA is just one of many possible sources of information you can use to verify or deny a relationship. Human error occurs when the results are transcribed, thereby providing false information. DNA results should always be used in concert with other sources.

ANYTHING YOU POST ONLINE WILL BE "BORROWED"

You need to accept the fact that any family information you post online will be "borrowed" or outright stolen, and you will probably not get credit for all your hard work. This is the nature of the beast... the internet. Get over it.

SPREAD THE WORD

You have our permission to use/publish these Golden Rules as much as you like. Just give us credit for them, okay?

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
