We hope to complete at least 9 more before delivering them to Joann's.








GENEALOGY COMMITTEE

Lafayette: The Hero of Two Worlds The Story of the Marquis de Lafayette and the Bicentennial of his Farewell Tour of America (1824 - 1825). Get ready to party like it is 1824!

Lafayette's Farewell Tour saw the French 67 year old last surviving major general of the American Revolution triumphantly return to the country he loved. From August 15, 1824 to September 9, 1825, Lafayette covered over 6000 miles by carriage, stagecoach, canal barge, and steamboat, traveling to all 24 exiting states and "Washington City." This presentation will cover the details of Lafayette's Farewell Tour of America, how it will be celebrated in 2024 – 2025, and how everyone will have the opportunity to get involved. Get ready to celebrate Lafayette, the Hero of Two Worlds.

Bio - Patricia L. Maclay, MD

Dr. Maclay is a lifetime member of the American Friends of Lafayette and serves on its Governing Board. She is the National Steering Committee Vice Chair responsible for the 13-month 24-state Bicentennial of Lafayette's Farewell Tour scheduled to kick-off in New York City on August 16, 2024. Beside national and local presentations on Lafayette's life and the Farewell Tour, she serves on multiple Tour planning committees including New York City, Philadelphia, and Washington, DC.

In DAR, Dr. Maclay is the National Chair for the new Franco-American Memorial Committee which is inclusive of the Lafayette Farewell Tour. She serves as a DAR Museum Docent, Corresponding Docent, and an outreach educator, is the immediate past Maryland State Historian and Regent of the Janet Montgomery Chapter in Rockville Maryland.



Saturday, March 16, 2024, 10 a.m. Terri Stern on DNA and Genealogy.

Terri is an expert in genealogy & DNA tools and research methods. She is well versed in use of Ancestry, AncestryDNA, Family Finder, 23&Me, GEDmatch, Genome Mate, Roots Magic, and more. Terri is affiliated with the Association of Professional Genealogists (APG) and the International Society of Genetic Genealogy (SOGG).

Deb is still confirming the topic but it will likely be either Autosomal DNA: How can it help me find Ancestors; or DNA and Brick Walls: Applying the Golden Rules.

The Great Backyard Bird Count 2024

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) (https://www.birdcount.org/) this year will be held on **February 16–19, 2024**. Birds are

everywhere, all the time, doing fascinating things! Anyone can participate in the Great



Backyard Bird Count. During four days in February **every year**, participants watch, learn about, count, and celebrate birds. There are 11,188 bird species in the world as of the beginning of 2023 – so let's celebrate!

During those days, spend some time in your **favorite places watching birds**—then tell the folks who run this wonder event about them! Who is behind the GBBC? They are: The Cornell Lab, Audubon and Birds Canada.

In as little as **15 minutes** you can notice the birds around you, like this Carolina Chickadee, common in Delaware. You can **identify** them, **count** them, and **submit** them to help scientists better understand and protect birds around the world. It's easy even for a novice!

The easiest way is to use one of the free apps available. These apps can be used on your phone where you can identify and record your bird sightings! Using these apps, your submissions over the 4-days count towards GBBC.

If you are new to bird watching, try loading and using **Merlin**

(https://www.birdcount.org/merlin-bird-id-

app/). This app will ask you questions including the size and color(s) of the bird you saw. When you finish the identification questions, you sighting goes to GBBC that weekend.

If you already use eBird (https://www.birdcount.org/ebird-mobile-app/), or Merlin, To use eBird, start a checklist and record your sightings for at least 15 minutes as instructed and submit when you are finished.

2024 Christina River Watershed Cleanup

Saturday April 13th starting at 8:00 AM



It is that time of year again to mark our calendars for the Christina River Watershed Cleanup! How does so much trash end up in the oceans? Much of it travels along the path of fresh water downhill and into the oceans by way of rivers.

The Christina River Watershed includes beautiful rolling hills, farms and forests, and large and small towns. But litter, dropped or dumped by anyone, can travel the Brandywine, White Clay, and Red Clay Creeks, and Christina River before continuing into the Delaware River. This watershed provides more than 75% of the water supply for residents and businesses in New Castle County, Delaware.

The Christina River Watershed Cleanup's mission has always been the removal of manmade debris from within this beautiful watershed, while raising public awareness for pollution prevention. Since the Cleanup began in 1992, more than 360 tons of tires,

appliances, household items, and other trash have been cleared from within the watershed.

There will be a DAR team that will meet early on April 13th at the historic Hale Byrnes House to pick up trash, bag it and move it to a pickup point nearby. Sadly, this area is known as a heavy trash site. We can use your help; bring your family including husbands, teenagers for community service hours, etc.

Here are the specific details you need to know! Our DAR team will meet at the Hale Byrnes House, 606 Stanton Christiana Rd, Newark, DE 19713, at 8:00 AM (because of the tides) to pick up trash until about 11:00 AM. It will be led by Sarah O'Donnell, State and Cooch's Bridge Conservation Chair. This event is **rain or shine** so dress for the weather and wear boots. Trash bags, some tools and gloves will be available, but you may want to wear your favorite garden gloves. DID YOU KNOW that the below activities ALL count as Service to America hours:

- Volunteering at local historical societies or associations
- Volunteering in schools, hospitals, and churches
- Volunteering with other lineage societies outside of DAR
- Transporting or sitting with those facing medical issues (non-family members)
- Service as a DAR chapter / C.A.R. senior society, state or national officer; committee chairman, vice chairman, cochairman, committee member, etc. This includes all planning, communication, board meetings, and committee meetings.

If you need help logging hours, or are unsure if your hours count, please contact Valarie.

*That is 30 hours per member for the year and is also based on the # of members on January 1, 2024. The goal for this year, with 25 members (so far), the hours will be 750.

What's a QUORUM? And why should you care

Our by-laws state that a quorum is 50% + 1 of our membership. We have 25 members as of January 1, 2024 and our quorum is 13.

A quorum is the minimum number of members that must be present at any of its meetings to make the proceedings of that meeting valid. A meeting quorum is required at our chapter meetings for the purpose of conducting and voting on new chapter business. Without it we can't make motions, change bylaws, initiate group projects, purchase items, donate money, and so forth. Please plan to attend as many meetings as possible so we can meet the quorum needed to achieve our chapter goals.



OPERATION PAPERBACK

Operation Paperback is a national, non-profit organization, whose volunteers collect gently-

used books and send them to American troops overseas, as well as veterans and military families here at home. Since 1999, we have shipped over 2.9 million books to countries all over the world (shown in orange on the adjacent map).

Step 1 - Collect

The following genres are most frequently requested: action, bestsellers, biographies and memoirs, fantasy, history, horror, mysteries, science-fiction, true crime. Do NOT send romance novels unless specifically requested by the individual!

Our troops have received a disproportionate amount of this genre and they aren't very happy about it.

Step 2 - Sort

Weed out any books that do not meet the standards of our program. Do NOT send:

- Ripped, stained, molding, damaged materials
- Religious material unless specifically requested (pamphlets and bookmarks included)
- Out of date items (ex. your uncle's map collection)

Remember that your package is a gift meant to entertain our troops and veterans! Take pride in what you send and don't be shy about pitching unsuitable materials into your recycling bin.

Then sort your books by genre. Also sort by hardcover/paperback. Overseas addresses receive paperbacks only. Domestic addresses can receive both hardcovers and paperbacks.
